

4-H Summer Camp Coming July 6—8! Camp Northwoods, Delta

2018 THEME:

"SUPER HEROES TRAINING CAMP"

If you are a young person in grades 3-8, you are invited to be part of this year's 4-H Camp, July 6-8 at Camp Northwoods in Delta. This will be our fifth year at this location. The camp is in a beautiful wooded area, has nice facilities, a great lake for swimming and boating, a group campfire area and all of the regular amenities. As always, the camp program will include swimming, arts and crafts, canoeing and kayaking, campfires and singing, nature education, skits, and large and small group games.

The theme this year is "Super Heroes Training Camp" and our program will be full of fun related activities.

Campers will arrive between 9-10 a.m. on Friday morning, July 6. Two nights will be spent with kids of the same age group and gender in a troop house that houses up to 22 or a yurt that houses 12. Check out will be the afternoon of Sunday the 9th.

Campers will be supervised by trained high school age counselors, 4-H Youth Development staff from Ashland and Bayfield Counties, and 4-H certified adult volunteers.

The cost for camp is \$85 for the 3 days, **\$70 if you are a 4-H member**. Check with your club to see if they provide scholarships. Further scholarship opportunities are available for families with more than one child attending camp or with financial need. *If your child or someone you know needs this assistance to be able to attend, please don't hesitate to request it on your registration form or call the 4-H office. Requests will be kept confidential.*

Registrations are due June 14 with payment. Registrations received after that time can not be guaranteed a spot, so get them in on time!

Note: Camp finances are run



through the Bayfield County UWEX office. Please make your checks out to **Bayfield County UWEX**.



On April 9th the Friendly Valley 4-H group met up at Becca's house & walked over to the Washburn High School. We got a tour of the high tunnel by Seth Johnson who works there. There is only spinach in the high tunnel. They are testing different ways of growing it. Seth's job is controlling the temperature by pulling a tarp over the rows of plants if it gets to cold and if it gets to hot he pulls them off. There is an automatic air vent if it gets really hot. They are testing different ways of growing it. Two rows had heaters and

pink lights. Two rows have only pink lights and no heaters and the last two rows have no heaters or lights.

Then after we toured the high tunnel we looked at the aquaponics set up. There were fish in barrels and their dirty water got pumped into tanks that had plants growing on top of them. The plants used the nutrients to grow while also cleaning the water for the fish. Then it was filtered more and pumped back into the fish tanks.

After that we went back to Becca's house and we planted herbs. We had the choice to plant cilantro, parsley, oregano, basil, rosemary and a few others.

Bayfield County Horse Education Project participants went to Wausau for the State Horse Bowl May 4&5. We took part in hippology, reading, speeches, demonstrations and horse bowl questions. Our county met a lot of new people. We even bonded over the trip. Mrs. Beeksma is our horse leader. She is an awesome leader. The people that make it special are Avana Beeksma, Garrett Rusch, Promise Kreinbring, Grace Kreinbring, Blake Kreinbring, Ella Houck, Jemma Christenson, Brielle Mesik and Allison Thomas, and adult helpers Mrs. Kreinbring, Mrs. Mesik and Mrs. Thomas. We had a lot of fun.

While we were waiting to compete in the horse bowl, we reviewed questions. We did a lot better than last year. One of our beginner teams took 7th place in the horse bowl. Garrett accepted the challenge to move up to junior level questions so that we could enter a team in that category. We are very excited for next year. We had good travels and fun in the hotel pool. A sample horse bowl question is to answer “what is a blemish?” It is “a scar or marking that makes the horse less beautiful for judging but does not interfere with movement or work of the horse”.

Avana received Top Ten awards for Beginner Team in Horse Bowl, Individual Points in Horse Bowl, Interpretive Reading and Public Speaking. Jemma received a Top Ten her *very first year* for Public Speaking. Ella was on the beginner team with a Top Ten finish. Grace had Top Ten finishes in Individual Demonstration, Beginner Team in Horse Bowl, Team Illustrated Talk with Blake and *first ever* Top Ten Hippology score from Bayfield County. Allison received a Top Ten for Individual Points in Horse Bowl. Promise took Top Ten in Interpretive Reading and Public Speaking and received Grand Champion for the *third year* in a row in the Team Illustrated Talk with Brielle – it was Brielle’s *first year* participating as well. Congratulations to these teams and thanks to our parents!



Bayfield County Fair Reduced Fee for 4-H Leaders

The Bayfield County Fair Committee recognizes the important role that 4-H Leaders play as project and club volunteers. Of this, a Season Pass will be available at a reduced fee of \$20 for Leaders who meet the following criteria:

- Active—have held at least two project meetings with members before the fair
- Certified - 4-H Online & Background check.
- Verified as active by club leader—must turn in request form to leader by club registration deadline

A season pass includes: admission, parking, unlimited carnival rides & free access to the grandstand shows for all four days of the fair.

Letters will be distributed to active, certified leaders explaining the registration process, which is different from last year.

- ◆ **ALL camping sites are assigned including primitive sites.**
- ◆ You must check-in at the Fair Office on the Fairgrounds to be assigned a camping site and receive your camping permit.
- ◆ Camping Permits will be available at the Fair Office on the Fairgrounds the Wednesday of the Fair from 2 pm - 7 pm & Thursday starting at 9:30 am.
- ◆ Place your camping permit in a visible spot. On your camper, place on or near the doorway.
- ◆ Primitive camping with horses should be set up in the designated "Horse Camping" areas only. Near the Horse Trailer parking - South of the Diamond (Green) Horse Barn.
- ◆ Remember to use "common sense" and "common courtesy" when setting up your campsite. Be respectful of others' sites.
- ◆ Generators are NOT allowed in the primitive camping areas.
- ◆ Anyone under the age of 18 must be camping with a responsible adult.
- ◆ Please follow all of the Camping Rules.

Swine Exhibitors

On January 19, 2018, Wisconsin passed new testing requirements intended to help control the spread of two diseases:



Swine Enteric Corona Virus disease (SECD), and Porcine Reproductive & Respiratory Syndrome (PRRS). Swine moving into, out of and within the state must now test negative for PRSS and SECD within 90 days of movement. Exhibitors who move swine into and out of the state for fairs or other exhibitions must now notify the DATCP. Exceptions to the testing requirement are:

- ◆ Swine that go directly to slaughter or to a veterinary clinic for treatment
- ◆ Swine returning from an out-of-state veterinary clinic.

Exhibitors are hereby notified that the 2018 Bayfield County Fair will be a terminal show for swine. Exhibitors may only bring one swine to the fair.

Talk to your Swine Project Leaders if you have questions.

Entry Tips

- ◆ Your Club Representative will pick up all the entry tags for your club. You need to pick them up from him/her.
- ◆ Affix your tags to your entries. Animal entries may have their tags affixed to stalls/pens.
- ◆ Bring ALL entry tags you received to the Fair - even if you're not entering some items.
- ◆ Give the entry tags for the items you did **NOT** bring to the Fair ("No Shows") to each Department Superintendent at the Fair on Thursday.
- ◆ Bring the items you are entering to the Fairgrounds on Thursday, August 9th from Noon—7* pm. (Your exhibit/booths must be finished by 7 pm.)
- ◆ Turn in your Exhibitor Pass Voucher at the Gate on Thursday to get your season wristband.
- ◆ If you have more than 10 entries please arrive at the Exhibit Hall or Garden Building no later than 6:00 p.m. on Thursday.
- ◆ Volunteer in the Exhibit Hall/Garden Building to earn a *free Season Pass!* See the volunteer form in this issue or go online to: www.bayfieldcounty.org/fair
- ◆ Learn from your experiences. Watch and listen to the judging
- ◆ Show your entries to friends and family during the Fair
- ◆ Pick up your entries on Sunday from 5:45—7pm. The Bayfield County Fair will not be responsible for any items left after 7 pm.

Reminder: Pets are not allowed on the Fairgrounds during the Fair.

Using the Barns?

Just a few reminders ...

- ◆ Have your health forms ready
- ◆ **Wait to unload your animal(s) until after you have checked with the Superintendent and have shown him/her any health forms.**
- ◆ All stalls and pens are assigned by the Superintendent.
- ◆ Park your truck and trailer in the main parking lot or at your campsite after you have dropped off your feed and animals. Space is limited!
- ◆ Straw, hay & wood shavings can be used for bedding. Do not use shredded paper for bedding.
- ◆ Wood shavings will be available for sale during the Fair at the Fair office.
- ◆ Keep the barns clean. This means thoroughly cleaning your stalls daily after the barns close - Not just covering things up with fresh bedding and hauling everything out on Sunday.
- ◆ **Do not eat or drink in the barns.** (For health safety reasons.) Set a good example for the Public.
- ◆ Keep your hands clean and wash them often.



- ◆ When the Public leaves the barns, thank them for stopping by and remind them that there are hand washing stations and Purell dispensers near the barn exits.

Getting to the barns ...

As usual there will be limited vehicle traffic allowed to the barns and camping areas. The times and gates to use are as follows:

- ◆ Friday- Sunday: 7am—9am – The driveway in front of office will be open to allow access back and forth to the barns North of Main Street.

NOTE: You must park your vehicle in the main parking lot or campsite by 9am


Starting at 11 am on Thursday, As you are driving to the barns Please follow these additional rules and guidelines:

- ◆ ALL persons in the vehicle must have a Daily or a Season wristband.
- ◆ After you have unloaded/loaded and fed your animals; you must park in the regular parking lot. **Parking near the barns is not allowed.**
- ◆ Be courteous to our gate workers; they are just doing their jobs.
- ◆ **SLOW DOWN!** If you feel like you could walk faster than what you are driving; that is the right speed!!!
- ◆ Expect the unexpected! Adults and kids don't always pay attention to what's going on around them - use caution.
- ◆ If the handicapped parking area is full (usually Sunday), please check in with the Fair Office.

Our goal to keep everyone at the Bayfield County Fair safe & accident free. We need your help to do this. Safety is everyone's job!
